


How accessible should the new village hall be for mobility issues?





How important is the availability of parking spaces when considering a new location for the village hall?





What are your thoughts on the environmental impact of the





COMMUNITY GARDEN & NATURE CONSERVATION AREA



Alongside the new hall we would like to create a community owned garden for the purpose of learning, socialising, providing produce (food & flowers) which is aesthetically beautiful, environmentally sustainable, and for pleasure!

A community garden can be both visually beautiful as well as productive, and sustainable, it could provide opportunities for wider social engagement across the village's generations developing greater collaboration and inclusion. The positive benefits of gardening on our mental health are well understood, and gardening is now offered as part of 'social prescribing.' The National Garden Scheme recently reported that "all over the country community gardens are demonstrating the ability to bring people together and introduce them to the joys of gardening and spending time in a garden".

Produce grown may be shared with participants, and surplus offered more widely perhaps for the benefit of local food banks or offered for sale at 'Community Garden Market Days' to further fund the gardens future.

It is likely that a garden and natural area would operate in its own right, on a charitable organisation basis, with the importance of sustainability, inclusivity, collaboration, learning and the natural environment at the forefront. It could have its own team of volunteers to lead and manage its development.
